Finding YOUR mission field 40-day emphasis at Baptist Church of Beaufort helps members identify where they can best serve

Since 2001, The Baptist Church of Beaufort has been looking toward its future through prayer and preparation rather than planning and predicting. "We want to look at how we can prepare our church for what God has in our future," said Eric Spivey, who was called in 2003 as associate pastor and minister of Christian formation and missions to lead what he calls the "ongoing futuring process."

"Through our prayer and preparation, we have determined that we want our church to be a world mission center," he said. "And as a result we have made changes to our organizational structure, to the way we give to missions, to the way we do missions and to the way we look at missions. We want to be missional Christians in a missional church."

To support that goal, the church has just completed a 40day devotional series called "Becoming a Missional Christian: A 40 Day Missional Journey," based on Acts 1:8. Finding no material that suited their needs, Eric and other church staff developed their own study guide.

"We pulled together a variety of missional books and daily devotionals," Eric said. Each week's study guide included a scriptural devotional piece, a prayer, a missions opportunity and a chance to respond. "My role is helping Christians make the connection between spiritual formation and missions. It is neat to see people respond." -Eric Spivey

"We also developed


a small group curriculum that we used in our Sunday School classes that went along beside the study material, and our worship focused on the theme for the week," he said.

A couple of special events were also held during the 40day study. A"Get in the Game Ministry Fair" helped members find potential service opportunities at booths of the church's approximately 20 missions teams.

Near the end of the 40 days, a Missions Celebration was held to which local, state and international missions partners of the church were invited to participate. On Saturday of the celebration weekend, church members worked on local mission projects around the Beaufort area through a Mission Service Challenge.

The church ended its 40 Day Missional Journey with a Missional Christian Commissioning service on March 13. "We had spent 40 days helping members determine where God has called them and on this final day we passed out missionary ID cards for them to fill in their names and their mission field," said Harry Rowland, the church's pastor for the past nine years. "Their field could be a place, like work or neighborhood; a


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The results of the 40-day journey

- 73 people committed to BE missional Christians.
- 3 people committed to be career missionaries.
- 6 people committed to be short term missionaries (1 month 2 years).
- 111 people committed to pray for missions.
- 142 people committed to do missions with "Jerusalem" (Beaufort) mission partners.
- 71 people committed to do missions with "Judea" (regional) mission partners.
- 41 people committed to be a part of a "Samaria" (national) mission experience.
- 35 people committed to be a part of a "Ends of the Earth" (Global) mission experience (Belgium, Liberia, Haiti, or Winter Olympics in Italy).

100 women attend annual conference at the beach

More than 100 women from 14 churches in South and North Carolina attended the second annual CBF Women's Conference March 11-13 at Myrtle Beach. Nancy Hastings Sehested, a pastor and prison chaplain from Asheville, NC, led the conference with sessions on "Companions for the Journey; Biblical Stories of Hope."

"She used biblical stories to describe how hope is alive — even after Good Friday and in the in-between time of Saturday — as we wait on Resurrection Sunday," said Christy McMillin-Goodwin, associate pastor at Oakland Baptist Church in Rock Hill and one of the conference organizers.

The Membership/New Church Starts Committee of SC/CBF funded a part of the conference. "We could not have provided this conference without their help," Christy said.

Preceding the general conference, 12 clergy women met for a Women in Ministry Conference. Nancy spoke about power issues in the local church. National CBF helped to sponsor this conference.

Plans are already underway for next year's conference to be held in early March at the Hilton at Kingston Plantation in Myrtle Beach.

The church also plans to send representatives to the Baptist World Alliance meeting in Birmingham, England this summer, and to connect with work in Liberia. Church youth also have their annual missions projects.

"I think our missional emphasis has given people a renewed vision and purpose for being here," Harry said. "It has made people realize that missions is a part of their lives, and made them more conscious to share Christ every day."

A by-product of the missional emphasis has been more intergenerational activities. "We might have some people in their 70s going on a missions trip with several of our youth," Harry said. "I think church members know and appreciate each other better."

"Our goal has been to help our people grow spiritually locally, then send them out," Eric said. "We have now seen an attitude change. Our focus is on the outside. We are excited about what God is doing."

"Not only did the teenagers spend much time rehearsing music, they spent great times together developing friendships that will last a lifetime," said Shelden Timmerman, associate pastor for music at Oakland Baptist Church in Rock Hill and an organizer of the festival. "From the Penguin Challenge to the dance, to times around the pool to time rehearsing and worshiping together to these teenagers learned a great deal about one another, about music, and about how music helps them relate to God."

Next year's festival is scheduled for March 24-26, 2006, at Springmaid Resort. Participation is limited to the first 300 singers registered. Details will be released early this summer.
