

PALMETTO STATE PARADE OF PREACHING AND SINGING 2003

Palmetto State Parade of Preaching and Singing.

Greenville, York and Estill are the sites of this year's Parade on Sept. 15, 16, and 18. Each event starts with fellowship at 3:30 followed by sermons from five different preachers, a keynote address, and plenty of singing led by different musicians in between, all to end by about 8:30 each night.

Supper is included at each meeting at a cost of \$7.50. No reservations are required.

The Parade of Preaching and Singing has been a regular, though not annual, event sponsored by SC/CBF. This year's Parade is being organized by the Mem-

bership Committee. "I believe it has been two years or so since the last one," said Jamie Norris, co-chair of the committee and pastor of Lawtonville Baptist Church

in Estill, site of one of the events.

"I view its purpose as twofold," said Norris. "It gives CBF-friendly laity and clergy a chance to get to know our neighbors and friends in the various regions of the state. Just being together for these worship experiences and the fellowship around the table at the meals is a healthy thing."

"Secondly, the events allow us to get to know who the other preachers and church musicians in our areas are," he said. "Some folks may get to know a potential revival or renewal event speaker or musician at the Parade."

"When we bring in some of our finest preachers to visit these different congregations we are following a very New Testament model, much as the apostles visited churches throughout Asia Minor to bring a word of exhortation," said SC/CBF Moderator Laurie Berry. "When the Parade of Preaching brings this shared experience to churches from the low country to the upstate, it reminds us that our churches don't exist in isolation from each other, but are part of an extended network of other congregations that form the body of Christ."

"This year our committee has made an intentional decision to highlight many of the female clergy who are very capable proclaimers of the gospel message but whose gifts are often unknown except in their local churches or ministry context," Norris said. "The same may be said for those who serve as musicians among us."

"At the same time we have invited a number of the gifted male preachers to speak so there is balance in the program in all three regional meetings," he said.

Despite the chocolates & lace, a tough mission field faces SC/CBF delegation

ven as you read this, a delegation from SC/CBF is traveling to one of the toughest mission fields in the world. Let's unpack that phrase, "one of the toughest mission fields in the world." What images come to mind? Slogging through a rainforest to a remote mountain outpost? Bearing witness for Christ under an oppressive regime? Ministering in the slums and shantytowns of the world's megacities?

Whatever your images, chances are you did not imagine Belgium, the land of chocolates and lace, placid farmlands, canals, and quaint village churches.

But Belgium is part of the modern, "post-Christian" Europe. Today only 5-6% of Europeans acknowledge *any* ties to a church tradition;

in Belgium, less than 1% of the population claims evangelical Christianity. Last summer, one of the singers in the Belgian Christian group Koinonia revealed that she was the only Christian in her high school – not in her class, or her grade, but in her entire school. Baptists in Belgium are often viewed with suspicion as some sort of cult group. It's easy for Baptist



Christians to become discouraged and wonder if the rest of the world remembers them and their tough mission field.

This week, SC/CBF will be there to show that we remember. Jack Couch of Clearview, David Deming of Brunson and Hickory Grove, and Harry and Lana Rowland of The Baptist Church of Beaufort are in Belgium for a week of meeting with leaders in the Belgium Baptist Union and exploring ways to develop the partnership with SC/CBF.

Please join with SC/CBF in prayer for this delegation as they travel, that they will have eyes to see, ears to listen, and hearts to learn from our Belgian brothers and sisters in Christ. Pray also for the SC/CBF missions committee as it works to strengthen the partnership between South Carolina and the Belgium Baptist Union, so that together we can reach a "post-Christian" culture for Christ.

The schedule:


Sept. 22: The American Legion Building, American Legion Road, Lexington, 7:00 - 9:30 pm.

By now many of you have heard that a year of listening and building relationships in North Charleston has culminated in the Metanoia Young Leaders Program (MYLP).

The program represents a partnership among Chicora Elementary School, St. Matthew Baptist Church and Metanoia. Chicora works with us to identify potential leaders at the school. St. Matthew provides volunteers and space at a much reduced cost. And Metanoia sets up and carries out the programming.

MYLP will give students a safe and positive place to spend time after school every weekday. The program began Aug. 25, and already I could write about countless ways God has been at work. Here's one.

After a unanimous St.

Matthew vote to house the Young Leaders program, only one real obstacle remained — moving — in Charleston in August. Ugh! Our office was just across the street from the church and so moving would require renting a truck, putting out the word for help and then undertaking the dreaded task of lugging stuff up three flights of stairs to our new home.

One friend drove down from Columbia. A Presbyterian pastor friend joined us along with a number of people from both Providence and St. Matthew Baptist churches here in Charleston. My parents even brought a truck of school supplies from North Carolina. Mom just retired as a teacher and donated her wealth accumulated through the years.

There we all were, lifting and straining, unpacking and sweating together; young and old, black and

white, wealthy and not so wealthy working together to get a truck load of stuff up three flights of steps to its new home.

That's when it happened. The Kingdom of God arrived. Not with thunderbolts and rumblings, but with laughter and new friendships. Suddenly, a group of people between whom society has put all kinds of barriers found that the God who

unites them is stronger than the powers that divide them.

In a really great moment of grace, the kingdom broke out somewhere between the first and last trip up those St.

Matthew steps and most of us left more alive than we were earlier in the day — even though our legs were exhausted and our backs ached.
